Holy Communion.

- ◆ Receive in silence by hand only
- ◆ Offertory: put your offerings in a Basket provided at entrance, exit or after communion in front of the Altar (Sanctuary)

During Mass No

- ◆ Offertory Collection baskets passing around
- ◆ Kneeling on pew's kneelers - but only on the floor if you wish.

Cleaners needed after each Mass

- ◆ Please remain in Church after communion if you want to help to clean the benches, surfaces and the Church after each Mass.
- ◆ Please remain in Church if you want to light a votive candle after communion

Please note that: ...

- ◆ We can only accommodate **140** people in a single Mass
- ◆ You **must** wear face covering or a mask while.
- ◆ Sanitise your hands on entering & exiting the church, We use one-way system.
- ◆ **Offertory collection - please put in a basket as you enter, or as you leave the church after communion**

NHS Test and Trace app is functioning: From 24th September the NHS has introduced the use of an app and QR code that allows members of the public who have downloaded the app onto their smartphones to keep a record within their phone of the places they have been to, and to receive public health messages quickly. This is designed to make it quicker and easier to trace contacts of those who contract Covid19, with a view to slowing the spread of the virus. Although the legal requirement to have a QR code only applies to church halls at present, government guidance states that churches should also put up QR codes. So, please if possible try to download the app because it will help reduce queues at the church doors while people provide contact detail to stewards.

Repent and Believe

Our life as Christ's followers has its ups and downs, its success, and failures. As one author puts it: "We fall, we falter, we fail, we make mistakes, and we hurt others. We talk about Christian love and mean to love, but how we fail!" We are full of hypocrisy. A hypocrite is like a pin – it points one way and heads another. There are people in a community who have a mixed characters or behaviour. There are those who are obedient, docile, and pious to a fault. And there are those who are somewhat naughty, often vivacious and at times even rebellious to the leaders. This Sunday gospel gives us a parable of two sons. First, says no, to his father's request to go to his vineyard, but later thought better of it, and says - yes. Second, says 'yes' straight away, but did not act on his promise. The second son here, is seen to be a yes-man, but he is worse than that. He is a hypocrite. He is a 'yes' in word, but a 'no' in deeds. The first son is in his sincerity, lack of pretension and double play. His rebellion is a negative expression of positive traits such as sincerity and openness. One may rebel but, given the willingness to review one's actions, the motivations grows, because it is open to the truth.

The two sons illustrate two types of people. And we know whom Jesus recommends and why. By this parable Jesus drives home a basic truth about us humans. It is dangerous to pretend that we are alright when we are not. We are rebellious and sinners. It is an ideal thing to be able to say always 'yes' to God. but often we say 'no'. Why not accept it rather than pretend to be OK? Jesus came to save sinners. And if we are not sinners, we have no salvation. Do we believe this? If YES, let us repent and be saved. This gospel's passage gives us the last days of Jesus on earth, as he speaks with his disciples, preaches to the crowds, and spars with the chief priests and elders. These events take place in Jerusalem and the surrounding area just before and during the feast of Passover. Jesus confronts the chief priests and the elders about their inability to change their position and repent even after hearing the preaching of John the Baptist. Due to their inability to repent and accept God's Word, they are ultimately rejecting Christ's salvation. Perhaps because the chief priests and elders did not want to be Jesus' sheep; they did not choose to hear his voice and follow him. The inevitable question is, do we want to hear Jesus and follow him? If yes, then all we need is a genuine desire to be converted to him with all our heart. Yes, we sometimes stumble and fall or fail, but God is always there, ready to pick us up. God never gives up on us, even though we may give up on ourselves. Jesus wants repentance, but the kind of repentance that takes us beyond good intentions. We know that conversion for most Christians is a matter of a whole lifetime. It is ongoing, it never ceases to challenge us. The result is that we become the kind of person we ought to be, not the kind we were. This deep inner change is possible only through the power of God's grace. But we must open our hearts to it. Jesus is always willing and anxious to hear any cry for help, to forgive, and to take us back.
