Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament

Every Saturday from **8:00am -9:00am** Holy Hour - Quiet moment in Prayer followed by Mass.

What you can do from 12th April

- community centres will be permitted to reopen,
- indoor children's activities will be permitted
- indoor leisure will be permitted for use individually or within household groups only (i.e. not for fitness classes or group sports)
- parent and child groups can meet indoors, with a limit of 15 people attending (children under 5 are not counted)
- wedding receptions or wakes for up to 15 people will be permitted **OUTDOORS ONLY**
- outdoor consumption of food will be permitted but table service will be required
- strict observance of social contact rules will be required, i.e. between household groups or individuals.

Fourth Sunday of Easter Year B

Readings: Acts 4:8-12; Psalm 117; 1st John 3:1-2; John 10:11-18

The Good Shepherd



In his book on the Holy Land, M. Thompson relates this tragic story. One day a young shepherd was tending his flock in the vicinity of Mt Tabor. Suddenly three Bedouin rustlers appeared. The young man knew what he was up against, but he did not run. He stood his ground and fought to keep his flock from falling into the hands of the outlaws. The fight ended with the young shepherd laying down his life for his sheep. *“I am the good Shepherd,”* declares Jesus, **“who lays down his life for the sheep” (Jn 10:11)**. We are the sheep. To take away our sins, he died on the cross. He did so out of sheer love for us. There was no selfish motive in his death. He was not like a hired shepherd who tends the sheep for money. Jesus was not merely doing his job. He was committed to love us. False teachers and false prophets do not have this commitment. Our Good Shepherd laid down his life for us, of his own free will.

Our Good Shepherd continues to care for us even after he has gone away from our physical sight. He gives himself in the sacraments, especially in the Eucharist. As Pope St Gregory said: The Lord laid down his life for his sheep that he might convert his Body and Blood in our sacrament and satisfy the sheep whom he had redeemed with the nourishment of his own flesh. Our Good Shepherd still heals the sick, a ministry which he had already begun with his apostles. It was in the Lord's name that St Peter cured a crippled man. *“In the power of the name of Jesus, that cripple stood perfectly sound” (Acts 4:10)*. The Lord Jesus literally lays down his life for his sheep through those servants of God who died as martyrs in our today's world. Yes, the love of the Good Shepherd for us is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow.

Is our own love for our fellow human beings as determined as Christ's love for us? Can we say that we are truly followers of our Shepherd in our care, concern, and selfless service to others? Perhaps not many today can say “Yes”. A layman said to a priest after Sunday Mass, *“You preachers talk a lot about giving but when you get right down to it, it all comes to basin theology.”* The clergyman asked, “What is basin theology? The layman replied: *“Remember what Pilate did when he had the chance to acquit Jesus? He called for a basin and washed his hands of the whole thing. But Jesus, the night before his death, called for a basin and proceeded to wash the feet of his disciples.”* It all comes down to basin theology. Which one will you use? Our Good Shepherd expects all of us both clergy and laity to be good shepherds to one another according to each one's vocation in life. Husbands and wives by doing more than enough for each other; parents by making extra work to show they care for their children; teachers by spending extra hour to instruct weak students; doctors and nurses taking up work to show they care for their patients; Religious Communities by being kind to each other; and parishioners by generously supporting their parish community. In a word, all of us are called to be deeply concerned about each other and committed to each other's welfare. Perhaps, we need some strong motives for selfless service to others.

The first strong motive is the example of our Good Shepherd himself. He did not ask, *“How much?”* He gave himself, his all. He did not ask, *“How far to go?”* he went all the way. The love of God is the most amazing thing for us. His love has not only created us in his own image but generated us as his sons and daughters.
